When God Was a Woman

6 weeks: January 13, 20, 27, February 3, 10, 17 10 – 15 students

This course offers a feminist perspective on mythology, anthropology, sexuality and religion and traces major figures, myths, concepts and symbols back to their pre-patriarchal origins. The course will cover a broad philosophy of harmony with nature, of human concord, sexual liberation, and feminist spiritual consciousness, as expressed and celebrated in a wild worship of the Universe.

Instructor: Carol Leonard is a retired midwife and writer. She wrote for the Bangor Daily News on her blog "Bad Beaver Tales." She was the first midwife licensed to practice legally in NH and has attended close to 1200 babies born safely in their own homes. She co-founded the Midwives Alliance of North America (MANA), representing midwives in the US, Canada, and Mexico. Carol was elected the second president of MANA in 1986. She has authored several books, including her 2010 memoir, *Lady's Hands, Lion's Heart: A Midwife's Saga.* Her new 2019 book, *Bad Beaver Tales: Love and Life in Downeast Maine*, is available on Amazon.

Preserving New England's Gardens

9:30 – 11:30 a.m. 4 weeks: February 11, 18, 25, March 3 7 – 18 students

This course will examine New England's changing landscape design styles over 250 years and discuss how historic landscape preservation works and doesn't work. This class will give students an overview of New England's garden history to enrich their future travel.

Instructor: Valencia Libby is a retired associate professor of landscape architecture and horticulture at Temple University. In 2004 she served as the Fulbright Distinguished Chair in Landscape History in Portugal. She has authored numerous articles on landscape preservation and women's history. Val has previously presented similar classes for ASC in 2016 and 2017.

Spiritual Wisdom from Hawaii and India

9:30 – 11:30 a.m. 6 weeks: January 7, 14, 21, 28, February 4, 11 8 – 15 students

Many lifelong spiritual seekers believe that the ancients possessed the necessary insight to live the most meaningful lives. This discussion-based class will focus on two lineages of this ancient wisdom. The Yoga Tradition is thousands of years old, and the class will examine Patanjali Yoga from the perspective of teacher and writer Michael Stone. The class will also take a deep dive into the sophisticated, mystical traditions of ancient Hawaii through the teachings of the revered spiritual elder Hale Makua. A small and optional part of each class will be devoted to meditation techniques from both traditions. In addition, participants will be encouraged to share their own spiritual practices. This will be a chance to learn from each other.

Instructor: Richard Parker holds a doctorate in Education from Penn, a master's degree from Dartmouth, and BA degrees in Religion and English from Middlebury. He taught English and Religion for over 40 years and was Head of School at Chestnut Hill Academy in Philadelphia for many years. Currently, a major focus of his teaching is in yoga, meditation, and modern shamanism. He teaches a weekly yoga class at Destination Health in Bar Harbor.

Short Stories of Honoré de Balzac

12:30 – 2:30 p.m. 4 weeks: January 7, 14, 21, 28 8 – 12 students

This course will explore the internationally acclaimed short stories of Honoré de Balzac (the French Charles Dickens), and will discuss the influences of evil and goodness, truth and deceit upon the finely drawn characters who inhabit the narratives. "An Episode of the Reign of Terror," "La Grande Bretèche," and "A Passion in the Desert" are among the selections.

Instructor: Annemarie Vickers Quin received her BA in History at Chestnut Hill College in Philadelphia, where historian Dr. John Lukacs was her major professor and advisor. She received her doctorate from the University of Maine and conducted postdoctoral study at Penn and at the Summer Literary Seminars in St. Petersburg, Russia. Annemarie has taught world literature for more than 30 years, including four courses previously with Acadia Senior College. Annemarie chooses a new focus each year to entice returning students. Class sessions are marked by a lively discussion.

Evolution of Thinking on the Geology of MDI from 1836 to Now

9:30 – 11:30 a.m. 6 weeks: January 8, 15, 22, 29, February 5, 12 10 – 25 students

Geologists have been visiting MDI since 1836 to view the exceptional exposure of a variety of rock types and explain their origin. MDI has been used as a testing ground for fundamental geologic concepts such as the origin of granite and the depression of the crust by the weight of the continental glacier. This course will examine the work on MDI of geologists in the context of the state of geologic knowledge in the eras in which they were working. The emphasis will be on how geologic thinking changed over time with the increase in geologic knowledge since 1836.

Instructor: Duane Braun holds a PhD from Johns Hopkins University and was a Geosciences Professor at Bloomsburg University, Pennsylvania, where he taught Environmental and Physical Geology, Geomorphology, Hydrogeology, and Field Geology. He also mapped the glacial deposits of northeastern Pennsylvania for the state Geologic Survey, taught Geology for Acadia Senior College, and revised the geologic maps of MDI for the Maine Geologic Survey.

Ruth and Duane Braun co-authored *Guide to the Geology of Mount Desert Island and Acadia National Park*, 2016.

Becoming a Better Photographer

9:30 – 11:30 a.m. 4 weeks: February 5, 12, 19, 26 4 – 8 students

What makes a photograph worth hanging on the wall or sharing on Facebook? The first step in becoming a better photographer is to recognize what makes a good image. Next you apply that knowledge to your own work. As you develop the skills to capture this vision, you will become a more satisfied artist. In this course, we will look at the elements that make a good image. The course will study the works of the masters and analyze each student's own images. Come prepared to share photographs and to give and accept constructive criticism.

Instructor: Bob Thayer taught high school science for 30 years and has been a park naturalist for over 30 years. Throughout this time he has been a professional photographer. His photographic interests are in capturing the natural environment, but he also has interests in everything from portrait to abstract photography. He has written several books on Acadia National Park and has many published images. Throughout his career Bob has had a particular interest in producing multimedia programs.

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Homemade Bread!

This four-week hands-on course will be conducted in Mary's home kitchen. The class will bake a variety of loaves using both commonly available commercial grains and interesting alternative and heritage grains. The students will create their own sourdough starter and share fun experiences and recipes. Students will need to complete some bread making processes at home and bring their own large mixing bowl.

Instructor: Mary Vekasi has been a bread-maker for 40 years, creating healthy food for her family and friends, including those with special dietary needs. She looks forward to sharing her knowledge with ASC students.

Without Reverence Things Fall Apart

4 weeks: January 16, 23, 30, February 6 3 – 12 students

What is reverence? Why is it considered one of the four classic virtues? Is it different from religion or spirituality? Using Paul Woodruff's book *Reverence: Renewing A Forgotten Virtue*, we will explore the concept and practice of reverence from ancient China and Greece to the present. No previous knowledge of philosophy or psychology is needed.

Instructor: William Bigelow has a MDiv degree from Andover-Newton Theological School and studied for five years at the C. G. Jung Institute, Boston. For thirty years, he served as minister and pastoral counselor for several churches on Mount Desert Island. This course is his tenth for Acadia Senior College.

Morning Mosaic

This class will begin with seeing possibilities and planning a design, observing a demonstration of glass cutting, and then selecting materials to create a mosaic piece or pieces for a wall or window.

Instructor: Liz Cutler is the founder of ArtWaves, MDI's community studio arts center. Liz is a full-time artist engaged in a sustained investigation of shape and color on form across multiple media. She has mosaiced stained glass

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incorporating a variety of objects for 9 years. She has a BFA in painting and is currently working on her MFA.

Carving a Common Loon

1:00 – 3:00 p.m. 4 weeks: January 23, 30, February 6, 13 5 – 10 students

Students will carve and finish a miniature (sixinch) loon in basswood. The students will receive a roughed out blank and will be able to finish the piece with a varying amount of detail. Students wishing to borrow a knife may do so to create more detail on their bird than possible in the allotted time. Approximately one-half of the class will be devoted to carving and one-half to painting.

Instructor: Steven Valleau has a Biological Sciences degree from Indiana University. From 1981 to 1985, he was a full-time bird carver based in his hometown of Orono, ME. During that time, he began teaching adult education classes in bird carving. Steven began demonstrating and teaching carving at the Wendell Gilley Museum in the summer of 1985. He has taught carving at local MDI schools during their annual Arts Weeks, starting at Mount Desert Elementary School in 2010. In the summer of 2018, he taught a Carving with Knives session at Shakerag in Sewanee, TN, and a Sandpiper class in the village of St. Germaine de Belves in southern France. Steven has been carving loons every year for 35 years. This will be his second carving class for ASC.
